## **AWLQ STATISTICS 2018/19 (compiled December 2019)**

The following statistics are divided into **two** sections:

#### **SECTION 1**

This section includes the total animals cared for by AWLQ in 2018/19 (over 10 000 animals, including all impounded animals in City of Gold Coast and Brisbane City plus many surrenders from the public, as well as unclaimed strays and surrenders from other surrounding South East Queensland and Northern New South Wales areas in need).

#### **SECTION 2**

This section includes Gold Coast City Council residents' animals only (i.e. almost 5,000 stray and surrendered dogs, cats and other animals such as birds, guinea pigs, cattle, horses and sheep.)

Gold Coast City data is particularly useful, for the following reasons:


- a. The Gold Coast is the sixth largest city in Australia and has the 2nd largest Council in Australia by population. It is one of few large Australian cities where the data represents the whole city (in this case, a growing city of 570,000 people (2016 Census data) with an estimated 13,000 to 16,000 new residents coming to the city each year. It is estimated the population will reach 600,000 by June 2020.
- b. AWLQ cares for all the pound animals for the Gold Coast City Council and receives all unclaimed strays. It also runs the only two shelters on the Gold Coast for animals surrendered by their owners. This has provided a unique opportunity to understand the issues and develop solutions to the oversupply of abandoned animals in a whole community.
- c. AWLQ has been working with the community to rehome all healthy and treatable animals, achieving this since 2016/17. The graphs below show that in 2018/19, 91% of all stray and surrendered animals were saved for the whole city. 7% of dogs and 10.5% of cats were euthanized due to irremediable suffering or presenting a serious risk to the safety of humans and/or other companion animals if rehomed.
- d. These Gold Coast statistics show the success of many strategies that AWLQ has put in place i.e. the Getting to Zero Model, to reduce the numbers of abandoned and euthanised animals. As well as increasing rehoming with innovative strategies, the G2Z model focuses on **prevention of abandoned animals** through:
  - Co-operative desexing programs subsidised by Councils. The number of Councils participating in NDN-managed programs is gradually increasing with 12 Councils providing funding for desexing subsidies for desexing of cats for residents in need of support this year.
  - Strategies to get lost cats and dogs home
  - Increasing availability and promotion of desexing at 2- 4 months of age in private vet clinics
  - Community veterinary clinics that ensure no animal has to be euthanized due to an owner's incapacity to pay
  - Raising awareness of the public, secondary students, teachers and TAFE students of how to keep animals happy and safe, particularly the importance of desexing cats before 4 months of age
  - Breeder permit systems with inspections to ensure good standards of care, and socialisation, and a requirement to desex kittens prior to sale or transfer.




